#### Tips for Parents

- Engagement: Talk to your baby, maintain eye contact, and smile!

- Routine: Try to get your little one into a soothing bedtime routine with gentle rocking and lullabies.
- Feeding: Watch for hunger cues to establish a feeding routine.

Tips for Parents
